Congratulations on the Inaugural Issue of the ASEAN Journal of Disaster Health Management (AJDHM). As the Chair of the Japan Advisory Committee for the ARCH Project (JICA Project for Strengthening the ASEAN Regional Capacity on Disaster Health Management), I would like to extend my heartfelt congratulations.

Launched in 2016 for a duration of ten years, the ARCH Project has been implementing three main pillars to contribute to the development of Disaster Health Management (DHM) in ASEAN:

- System Building: We have supported the establishment of the Regional Coordination Committee for Disaster Health Management (RCCDHM) within the ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community. Additionally, a system has been created to enable the submission of disaster health management status reports and recommendations to the Senior Officer Meeting on Health Development (SOMHD). In parallel, we have collaborated with the ASEAN Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on Disaster Management (AHA Centre) to enhance the "One ASEAN, One Response" concept during disasters. A new Chapter 7 regarding the reception and support systems for Emergency Medical Teams (EMTs) response operations was added to the Standard Operating Procedure for Regional Standby Arrangements and Coordination of Joint Disaster Relief and Emergency Response Operations (SASOP). To ensure the continuity of these systems and to implement the secretariat functions, the ASEAN Institute for DHM (AIDHM) has been established at Gadjah Mada University in Indonesia.
- 2. Education and Capacity Building: We have developed standardized DHM education tools, such as the Basic Disaster Health Management Course (B-course), Coordination Course for EMT (C-course), and the Health Need Assessment Tool. Among the training initiatives held in Japan, the Knowledge Co-creation on DHM Course (KCCP) has been organized three times with participation from all ten ASEAN Member States (AMS). Additionally, three JICA courses for Emergency and Disaster Medicine were held for

Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, and Vietnam. We also conducted five ASEAN Regional Collaboration Drills (RCD), with participation from all ten AMS.

3. Academic Approach: Under RCCDHM, we have established the ASEAN Academic Network on DHM (AANDHM), which includes National Focal Points (NFPs) from each AMS and research institutions from both inside and outside of ASEAN. As part of this network, the Steering Committee, which is consisting of one representative from each AMS NFPs has been formed. The Joint Research project among multiple AMS is initiated to conduct, and the ASEAN Academic Conference on Disaster Health Management (AAC on DHM) has been held every two years to share academic achievements from AMS countries, as well as to invite the speakers from non-ASEAN countries.

As a result of these collective efforts, the publication of AJDHM has come to fruition. As the first specialized journal on DHM in ASEAN, it is my sincere hope that this journal will be widely read, not only within ASEAN and Asia but also by disaster health researchers across the globe.

The ASEAN nations are among those most prone to disaster. This historical reality is exacerbated by growing populations, urbanization, deforestation, violence, dislocation, and rapid global travel and commerce that can facilitate disease spread. These intensifying factors are made even more threatening by the growing impact of climate change. At the recent global meeting of the World

Health Organization (WHO) Emergency Medical Teams, climate change was described as "a sleeping dragon." When asleep, benign; but when awakened, the whole earth trembles.

Beyond rising seas, more frequent and intense storms, and altered weather patterns, climate change is impacting air quality, fueling wildfires, supporting vector spread and novel disease emergence, and adversely impacting agriculture and nutrition.
